
## fabric traditions

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# fabric traditions

### Supplies & Tools

- 1 yd Cotton Fabric
- Jean Jacket
- Tracing paper or parchment paper
- Basic sewing supplies (scissors, needle, thread)
- Sewing Machine

### Directions

- **1.** Find an area on your jacket that you wish to up-cycle. We chose the center back and cuffs.
- **2.** Take your tracing paper, or parchment paper, and create a pattern by tracing over the up-cycle area.
- **3.** Add a 1/4" seam allowance along the edges of your pattern.
- 4. Cut out the pattern and place on the right side of your fabric, pin in place and cut out.
- Using an iron on low, turn under the wrong side of the fabric using a 1/4" seam allowance and iron flat to conceal the raw edges.
- Place fabric in the desired location on your jacket, pin in place and stitch to the jacket making sure you stitch close to the edges.

\*\*No sewing machine? No problem! You can use any light or medium weight iron on

interfacing to hold your fabric to your jacket. We suggest using Stick from Fairfieldworld.
Just trace your pattern, DO NOT add a seam allowance and cut it out on both fabric and interfacing. Iron in place to hold.

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
